Dear Colleagues, we are optimistic that a new dawn is breaking and that peace, stability, security and good economic governance, as well as sustainable development will help us achieve the goals set in the post-Cotonou Agreement and those which we have set for ourselves, namely, eradication of poverty and disease and ending economic powerlessness. As we do so, we draw strength from the founding fathers of the erstwhile "ACP Group" whose achievements we shall always consider with pride. May we all be inspired to face the future with renewed vigour, loyalty and dedication to our Organisation.

Dear Colleagues, I would like to put on record my gratitude to you all who have logged in from the Pacific, the Caribbean and Africa, the ultimate proof - if proof was ever needed - that no pandemic, no lockdown, can prevent us from getting together. Together We Are You have enriched the debate with your Stronger. valuable contributions. Our thanks to our Secretary-General, H.E. Georges Rebelo Pinto Chikoti and our Secretariat for their constant support and dedication and for their full collaboration which has enabled us to conduct our meeting successfully.

Dear Colleagues, I thank very much the Committee of Ambassadors for their valuable work under the leadership of H.E. Ambassador Jestas Abuok Nyamanga. In a very special way, I thank very much the OACPS Chief Negotiator, Prof. Robert Dussey, Minister for Foreign Affairs, African Integration and Togolese in Diaspora of Togo, and his Ministerial Central Negotiating Group, together with the Ambassadorial Negotiating Group and the TNTs for their valuable work and efforts they all put into the negotiations of the new partnership agreement with the EU.

Dear Colleagues, last but not least I wish to extend my heartfelt thanks to the interpreters who have worked excellently to enable the Council to conduct its business smoothly and efficiently. I really thank you for the valuable work you have done during these three days of our session.
